(items of interest in the local newspapers of years past)

Bar Harbor Record June 17, 1903

The fishing business in Manset has been unusually good this spring. All the boats both large and small have been making good trips. **Captain James Parker** has already bought 500,000 pounds, which is 100,000 pounds more than had been bought at the same date last year. (Barbara Godwin)

LOOKING BACK:

Bar Harbor Record

July 8, 1903

The post office at Southwest Harbor was entered Friday Night by professional burglars, the safe blown open and about \$800 stolen. The work was so cleverly done that the office was not damaged in the blast. The safe was covered with about \$100 worth of blankets and robes taken from a nearby stable, and the explosion was arranged so carefully that not a sound was heard. The robbery was not discovered until about 5 o'clock when the front door of the office was found wide open.

August 5, 1903

The complete summer timetable went into effect with three boats in commission. The *Norembega*, **Capt. Dickson**; *Sappho*, **Capt. Sadler**; and *Sabanoa*, **Capt. Foss**. Six trains arrive at Mount Desert Ferry, every day and the same number departs. By means of these three boats, all points on the bay and Mount Desert Island are given train connection both out- going and incoming.
