The view from Beech Hill prompted this description from a Mrs. Burton Harrison as she was quoted in M. F. Sweetser's *Chisholm's Mount Desert Guide Book:* 

"Beech Hill is a place where you climb up a rocky stairway to reach a summit, whence, looking down, you behold the greater part of the beautiful island stretched in a green map at your feet, cleft by the silver fiord of Somes Sound, and adorned by many a sparkling lake-gem. Here, sitting on beds of juniper...you may, if you have nerve enough, look down a sheer precipice of granite hundreds of feet into the silent shadows of Echo Lake beneath."

#### **SWH'S OLDEST RESIDENT**

In December, 2013, Fern Leonard, 96, was presented with the Boston Post cane as Southwest Harbor's oldest resident. Currently living at Birch Bay Village, Ms. Leonard has lived and worked in Southwest Harbor as manager of Bar Harbor Bank, and served on the town's warrant committee. She later became a loan and trust officer for the bank at its Bar Harbor office. Jack Gilley (pictured below with Ms. Leonard) and Rich Viera attended the presentation as representatives of our historical society.



In 1999, J. Murray Johnston wrote his memories of Mt. Desert and the Manset shore. Read on.

In 1906 or 07 my father, Dr. John Johnston was born in Scotland and educated at St. Andrews University. He won a scholarship to MIT in Boston. During the summer of the 1<sup>st</sup> year he was there, his Professor who had come to Mt. Desert for some years, brought my father with him to stay at the Stanley House in Manset, where the Spahr House is now situated.

The scenery of Mt. Desert is so similar to the west coast of Scotland that my father was immediately captivated. After my parents were married, they too came to stay at the Stanley House for holidays, and in 1917 they built the cottage on the Manset Shore. There were additions made in 1923 and '29. The contractor in each case was R.M. Norwood and Company.

When the cottage was built, there were so many trees we could barely see the water. In those days, of course, there were no automobiles on the island, and one had to do shopping by boat, or bicycle, or horse and buggy. My mother ordered food by the case sent up from Boston by the steamer.

I remember the year the cottage was built we came from St. Louis where we lived at that time by train, and boat from New York to Boston. That particular trip, the boat had to be blacked out because a German submarine had been sighted off Newport. Then from Boston we took the boat to Rockland and finally boarded the J.T. Morse from Rockland to Southwest Harbor, landing at the steamboat wharf at Clark Point, now the Coast Guard Station. The final leg of the journey to the cottage was in a fancy horse drawn vehicle driven by Rodney Clark, who was also the agent for Eastern S.S. Lines.

Chris Lawlor delivered ice and Walls Coal Company delivered coal for the stove which was the only cook stove at that time. For lighting we had kerosene lamps and candles.

I remember my father rowing the family to Valley Cove for picnics and I usually was delegated to row or walk to Manset to get the mail.

Ice was cut in a pond back of Manset and went by overhead chutes across the road to the ice house adjoining the fish wharf. When the Addison Packing Company ran the sardine factory at the head of the harbor, and the boats (Surfman and Safety) came in with their loads, I remember running down to watch the waves from their wake break on the rocks at the shore. And then my children did the same thing when the Joyce Marie came into the harbor in the late 1940's and '50's. Now, the grandchildren watch a parade of yachts going to and from the Marina.

I have spent part of each summer on Mt. Desert since 1914, except for 1938 when I was in Europe. This past summer, 1999, we had our 4 children, 7 of our 8 grandchildren and 2 great grandchildren visiting with us. Starting with my grandmother, this makes 6 generations of Johnstons who have occupied the cottage on the Manset Shore.

One of our archivists, Becky Burnham, has done extensive research on MDI early settler Stephen Richardson. She is now looking for information on the Galley family that married into the Richardson family. She is making the following request:
