August 15, 1946 Bar Harbor Times

On August 7th the Square Deal Club held its monthly meeting at Odd Fellows Building and the members voted to start a buyers strike against the high cost of foodstuffs and issued a strike call as follows: The Square Deal Club of Southwest Harbor, an organization formed by some of the wage earners of Mt. Desert Island, does hereby pledge itself and its members to carry on a Buyers Strike against the high prices now being charged for food in the retail stores where we live and work. We pledge that we will not buy meat, seafood, fruit, or any other items upon which the price has risen sharply in recent weeks, nor will we purchase any item on which the price is not plainly marked, nor will we buy any more food items than are necessary for our family use from day to day until prices are again considered reasonable. We seek the support of all workers in this fight to bring down the cost of living.


